"And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will to men." Luke 2:13-14 KJV

Opening our concert of Angel songs is a medley of traditional carols expressing the joy, peace, and good will of Christmas in fresh and festive ways. Included here are Joy to the World; O Come, O Come, Emmanuel; We Three Kings; and the Ukrainian Bell Carol.

Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the king, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews? For we have seen his star in the east and are come to worship Him." Matthew 2:1-2

Three Byzantine mosaics, found in churches in Palermo and Venice, Italy, inspired Swiss composer Franco Cesarini to compose a large, symphonic work on three scenes in the life of Christ: the nativity, the temple in Jerusalem, and the resurrection. These movements, though essentially classical in form but using motives of Gregorian chant, border on the



rhythmic and tonal qualities of the impressionistic and are reminiscent of the music of Respighi. The subdued opening of "The Nativity" creates a mood of wonderment, as if the kings who had come bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, were for the first time casting their gaze on the Christ child. As their wonder intensifies into rejoicing, the music stirs into dramatic unison praise and adoration before returning to the subdued, gentle opening.

The traditional melody, with roots extending back to Tudor England [1485-1603], is one the best known and most often performed carols of the season. The lyrics for this tune were written by English poet and hymn writer William Chatterton Dix in 1865. The text opens with the question "What Child Is This?" This setting draws the listener into a traditional Irish celebration that begins with a mysterious solo statement based on the first lines of the carol and ends in an exciting flurry, like that of a rustic Irish fiddler.

In the mid-1940's, just after WWII, dynamic young choral conductor Robert Shaw, in collaboration with renowned choral arranger Alice Parker, selected and arranged two dozen carols from various cultures for unaccompanied chorus. The Robert Shaw Chorale was subsequently formed to record them for RCA Victor, and they became an instant success. Encouraged by the success, Shaw and Parker arranged and recorded another two dozen carols, again to great popularity. Their successes, plus a recording by noted contralto Marion Anderson, convinced RCA to commission distinguished composer Robert Russell Bennett to select and arrange eighteen of the thirty-six Shaw/Parker carols for large orchestra, chorus, organ, harp, and lute. The result: four marvelous suites titled *The Many Moods of Christmas*, with Robert Shaw conducting his chorale and the RCA Victor Orchestra. The wind band has long envied the orchestral world because these suites were unavailable until 2019, when this suite was transcribed by Mark Rogers. Included in the band set are the carols *Joy to the World, Pastoral Symphony* from Handel's *MESSIAH*, *Away in a Manger, The March of the Three Kings*, and *Fum, Fum!* Note by Albert Petrak

Four notes...that is all it is...four simple pitches. Yet the tune that is created by those four notes is memorable, nearly unending, and is now ubiquitous at Christmas. The melody has its roots in the shadowed, ancient times of the Baltic tribes. Before the Ukrainian tribe converted to Christianity in the late 10th century, the chant was part of the winter songs sung to celebrate the change in season. Gradually it became associated with Christmas and with Ukrainian culture. In the early 20th Century, Composer Mykola Leontovych arranged the chant into a four-voice choral work that was taken on world tour in 1916 and became wildly popular. Following the Russian occupation of Ukraine in 1920, performance of the four-note tune was outlawed and Leontovych was murdered by a Russian agent. The words now used were penned in 1936 by American composer Peter Wilhousky.

The composer of "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen" is unknown. There is record of its being sung within the Christian Church since the early 15th century. The hymn was first put into print for the general public when William B. Sandy included a version of it in his publication *Christmas Carols Ancient and Modern* (1833). It was subsequently added to various hymnals and carol books. In 1843 Charles Dickens included the song in his popular novel *A Christmas Carol*. Everybody's favorite villain, Ebenezer Scrooge, showed a depth of his sad self in this paragraph from Dickens classic: "At the first sound of 'God bless you merry, gentlemen, May nothing you dismay!' Scrooge seized the ruler with such energy of action that the singer fled in terror, leaving the keyhole to the fog and even more congenial frost." This carol is also known as "Tidings of Comfort and Joy," the phrase that ends each stanza of the lyrics. It is an affirmation of the joy of His birth and the power to release us all "from Satan's power" that He offers.

The Nutcracker ballet is the most often performed ballet in the world—a community of any size will have multiple performances by professional, amateur, or children's ballet troupes. (Greenville alone has fourteen performances listed!) It has been mounted worldwide each Christmas since its premiere in 1892, and it contains some of Tchaikovsky's most recognizable and popular melodies. This short dance, the trepak, was conceived as one of the "character dances" in the ballet, and Tchaikovsky gave it the tempo marking of molto vivace – prestissimo, which means 'very lively—as fast as possible,' a tempo that perhaps describes some of the panic and rushing about that the Christmas season brings to us.

Toboggan......JaRod Hall (b. 1991)

Snow is rare and usually not too deep in most of the South, so Southerners may have only story-book knowledge of the terrifying thrill one gets from riding the long, narrow sled down the steepest, longest hill in the neighborhood. Snowfall generates excitement and the children congregate at the favorite hill. Each toboggan run starts expectantly, slowly, perhaps even peacefully before gaining speed as the riders careen gleefully down the slope. Composer, band director, and tubist JaRod Hall gives us a musical afternoon of chills, spills, thrills, and laughter.

Midnight Sleighride, from Lieutenant Kijé Suite Serge Prokofiev (1891-1953)

In 1953, Eddie Sauter and Bill Finegan, two highly creative and unique jazz band leaders and arrangers, wrote a holiday work for their big band based on Russian composer Serge Prokofiev's familiar "Troika" from *Lieutenant Kije*. Sauter and Finegan were known for their humor and for experimentation with sounds, including such playful additions as those created by kazoos, ratchets, glockenspiels, chimes, and an array of bells. Sauter occasionally joined in performing on a toy trumpet, and Finegan joked that his most effective solo with the band consisted of chest-thumping sounds, to model horses' hooves, which he provided for the band's rendition of *Midnight Sleighride*. Tom Wallace's setting of the Sauter-Finegan chart retains all the wit and charm of the original and features delightful high woodwind and low brass effects. This is pure holiday fun!
